OBJECTIVES OF THE SESSION	<p>Work on the specific content of the Social Sciences subject in relation to Egyptian religion. Describe Egyptian deities and the subject-specific vocabulary.</p> <p>Address the content covered in English language classes in relation to both physical and personal descriptions.</p> <p>Create their own personality test using the Egyptian deities characteristics.</p> <p>Use the conclusion of the test created to try to define themselves by using these adjectives.</p>

<p>SHORT DESCRIPTION OF THE SESSION</p>	<p><i>The following planned activities aim to explore Egyptian deities through various formats that encourage collaborative work, practice reading, writing, and listening skills. This will be done through digital presentations, videos specifically created for this topic, ED puzzles, flashcards, and the necessary materials to create an Egyptian deities personality test. The assessment will be conducted in two ways: through the students using a check-list and through the teacher using a rubric.</i></p>
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<p>S E S S I O N 1</p>	<p>Activity 1</p>	<p>Presentation about Egyptian religion will be made to the group class with an explanation from the teacher. (20')</p> <p>In this presentation, key words that the students need to be familiar with will be emphasized. The teacher will randomly ask selected students for the meanings of these words, and the definitions will be written on the board. The students will then be required to note down these key terms in their notebooks, thereby creating their own glossary of the topic. (40')</p> <p>Annex 1</p>
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S E S S I O N 2	Activity 1	<p>Watch the specifically created video so that the students will now become acquainted with the main Egyptian gods, which includes written subtitles. The entire video will be watched. (5')</p> <p>https://youtu.be/LbaZ0DbB6ol</p>
	Activity 2	<p>The students will sit in groups of four to work collaboratively and will be given flashcards with definitions (which they will initially read out loud). (6 groups) Each member of the group will be assigned a specific role: facilitator, initiator, spokesperson and notetaker. We'll watch the video again and it will be paused at points where specific vocabulary appears, and the teacher will ask who has the flashcard with the definition of that specific word. The definitions will be written on the board, and the students will need to add them to their glossaries. (25'')</p> <p>Annex 2</p>
	Activity 3	<p>To ensure that the whole class has understood the content of the video, it will be transformed into an EDpuzzle. Each question will need to be discussed by each group of four, and a spokesperson from each group will provide the answer. In this way, the whole class will work together to complete the EDpuzzle. S	Activity 1	<p>Presentation of the final activity. Do you know what a personality test is? Have you ever taken one? (5')</p>



E S S I O N 3		
	Activity 2	<p>In each collaborative team, two personality tests will be distributed: "What type of animal are you?" and "What type of influencer are you?" All group members must take the test and record their results. The facilitator will ask the questions to their mates. The notetaker will record the results of each question. The initiator will ask the questions to the facilitator. Each desk will have dictionaries available in case there are words they do not know (which they will need to note down for a later discussion). (20')</p> <p>Annex 3</p>
	Activity 3	<p>Let's share the results with the whole class. The teacher will ask: What types of animals have come up? And influencers? Which words did you have to look up in the dictionary? Students will be asked to put their hands up to give answers and all these results will be noted on the board. (20')</p>
	Activity 4	<p>The final activity is introduced: students will need to create a personality test featuring Egyptian gods.</p> <p>Annex 4</p> <p>The teacher will give each group a document with instructions and examples so that the groups can create the test.</p> <p>Annex 5</p> <p>The evaluation process will be explained, including the presentation of the peer-evaluation checklist and the teacher's assessment rubric, so students understand the criteria that will be considered. (15')</p> <p>Annex 6</p>



S E S S I O N 4	Activity 1	In collaborative tables, each group will be randomly assigned 4 Egyptian gods, along with their descriptions, myths, and attributes. With access to a dictionary, they will create a personality test based on these four gods. The teacher will collect the tests. (1h)
S E S S I O N 5	Activity 1	The co-assessment process will begin, with each table receiving a test from a different group. The group members will take the test they have been given and record the results, as well as any words whose meanings they do not know. (20')
	Activity 2	Vocabulary doubts will be shared, and the table that created the test will need to explain the definitions. Questions will be written on the board, and students will be required to note them down in their notebooks. (15')
	Activity 3	The co-assessment process is initiated, distributing the checklists to each of the groups. (10')
	Activity 4	Each group will present the results of their peer evaluations, providing justifications for their decisions. (15') Afterwards, the teacher will conduct her assessment using the rubric previously shown to the students.



<p>In terms of academic content, what are the students learning and what are they learning to do?</p>	<p>Students will work on the curriculum content related to Egyptian religion, specifically the characteristics and attributes of the gods. Additionally, students will need to work collaboratively and learn to read and synthesize the information provided to them, creating the questions and answers for the personality test and summarizing the characteristics for the gods studied.</p>
<p>In terms of language, what are the students practicing or learning to do?</p>	<p>The students will practice how to conduct both physical and personal descriptions. Additionally, they will engage in reading, listening, and writing activities and be able to synthesize information. They will also work on identifying key terms in both English and Social Sciences, creating their own glossary.</p>
<p>In what way is this lesson plan a good example of what we learnt in the GEP course modules?</p>	<p>In this case, techniques related not only to reading and writing (creating the test and writing their glossaries) have been applied but also the creation of specific materials for this activity such as EDpuzzle, flashcards, or reading material adapted to the activity and the students.</p>
<p>Other important information</p>	<p>The materials for these activities have been designed and created exclusively for their use, just like the images.</p>

ANNEX 1



The Egyptians **worshipped** many gods (**polytheism**). The gods were often depicted with human bodies and animal heads.

The gods lived in temples. Temples were also centres of **knowledge**, where astronomical observations, mathematical calculations and building techniques were studied.

Priests conducted religious rites. Along with the pharaoh, they were the only ones who could communicate with the Gods.

The **wellbeing of the community** depended on the Gods. They ruled over the forces of nature such as air, water and fire.

ANNEX 2

Female priest, which means she is a religious leader authorized to perform sacred rituals and ceremonies in a particular religion or spiritual tradition.

A type of bird known for its powerful flight, sharp vision, and hunting skills.

A long stick with a curved end, often used by shepherds to manage and herd sheep.

A tool with a long handle attached to a short, heavy stick by a chain or rope.

A decorative headpiece that is designed to resemble a throne, often associated with royalty or significant religious figures.

The quality of having experience, knowledge, and good judgment.

The spiritual or immaterial part of a human being or animal, regarded as immortal or the essence of individual identity.

A word used to express good wishes when parting or at the end of a conversation.

You can find this information in the 'Characteristics' section of each god's page. You can also find this information in the 'Notes' section of each god's page. You can also find this information in the 'Activities' section of each god's page.</p> <p>02 USE CONCRETE DETAILS TO HIGHLIGHT KEY TRAITS OR BEHAVIOURS</p> <p>Use concrete details to highlight key traits or behaviours. For example, if you are creating a question about Ra, you could use the fact that he is the god of the sun. This will make your question more specific and easier to understand.</p> <p>03 FORMULATE OPEN AND SUGGESTIVE QUESTIONS</p> <p>Formulate open and suggestive questions. This means that your questions should not have a single 'right' or 'wrong' answer. Instead, they should encourage the respondent to think and express their own ideas.</p> <p>04 USE SCENARIO OR HYPOTHETICAL SITUATIONS</p> <p>Use scenario or hypothetical situations. This means that your questions should be based on a specific situation or scenario. This will make your questions more engaging and easier to understand.</p>	<p>INSTRUCTIONS HOW TO DO YOUR PERSONALITY TEST CREATING RESPONSE OPTIONS</p> <p>01 ASSESS EACH OPTION A CORRESPONDENCE WITH A GOD</p> <p>Each response option should correspond to one of the response options. This means that you should think about which god each option is most likely to be associated with. This will make your questions more specific and easier to understand.</p> <p>02 BALANCE THE OPTIONS TO COVER VARIOUS ASPECTS</p> <p>Balance the options to cover various aspects. This means that you should make sure that your options cover a range of different traits or behaviours. This will make your questions more comprehensive and easier to understand.</p> <p>03 CLEAR AND CONCISE WORDS</p> <p>Use clear and concise words. This means that you should use simple and straightforward language. This will make your questions easier to understand and more engaging.</p> <p>04 CHOOSE OPTIONS IN A LOGICAL ORDER</p> <p>Choose options in a logical order. This means that you should make sure that your options are presented in a clear and logical sequence.
