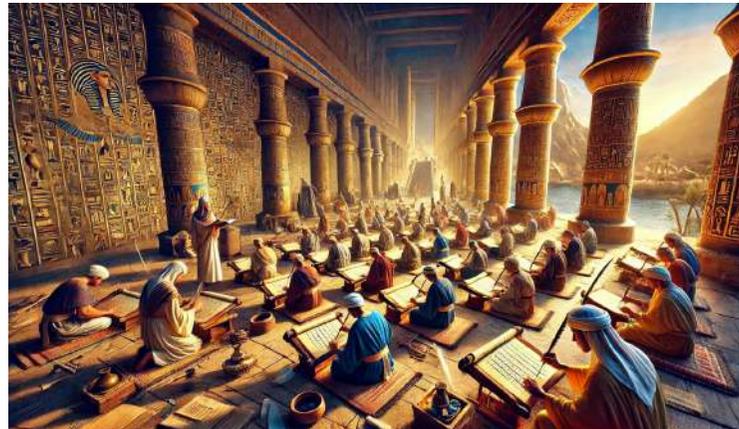

Each group will work on a chapter of a guide called *The Lost Knowledge of the Scribe Academy: A Guide for Sustainable Civilizations*.

What can Ancient Egypt and Mesopotamia teach us about creating a sustainable civilization?

### FINAL PRODUCT

At the end of the project, we will create a guide called *The Lost Knowledge of the Scribe Academy: A Guide for Sustainable Civilizations*. This guide will help people understand how ancient civilizations lived and how we can use their ideas to make our world better today. Each group will work on one chapter and present it to their mates.

2. *Discourse Genres: Narrative (writing a diary entry as a scribe), Explanatory (explaining ancient systems; e.g., irrigation, trade routes), Argumentative (debating the importance of education in ancient and modern times), Descriptive (describing agricultural practices, religious rituals or city layouts), Comparative (contrasting ancient practices with modern sustainability practices).*  
*Text types: Diary entry (students will write as scribes describing their day), Informational text (explaining a historical practice, e.g., how the Nile's flooding ensured agricultural success), Reflection (writing about connections between ancient practices and SDGs), Group presentation script (organized speech explaining their findings and visual materials).*
3. *Classroom phrases ("Can you explain that again?", "What does this word mean?"), Collaborating with peers ("Let's compare our answers", "How should we organize this?"), Presenting findings ("Our chapter focuses on...", "This diagram shows how..."), Debating ("I think education was more important because...", "But without irrigation, they wouldn't have food")*  
*Language for feedback and reflection: "I think you could add more details about...", "I liked how you explained...", "What I learned from this activity is..."*

#### OBJECTIVES OF THE SESSION:

*Analyze the purpose and structure of the project (Guide of Sustainable Civilizations).

## SESSION 2: How people lived in Ancient Civilizations?

### OBJECTIVES OF THE SESSION:

*Understand the importance of water management in Mesopotamia and Egypt.*

*Identify the significance of scribes in preserving knowledge.*

*Examine the structure and functionality of cities like Babylon and Thebes.*

*Recognize the connection between gods, nature, and sustainability.*

*Explore how trade contributed to the development of Mesopotamia and Egypt.*

*Learn and use specific vocabulary.*

*Develop reading comprehension and critical thinking skills by analyzing texts and maps.*

### CONTENT-OBLIGATORY LANGUAGE FOR THE SESSION:

- Academic language: *The rivers provided fertile soil for farming. Canals brought water to the fields.*
- Grammar: **Past tense:** *People dug canals to bring water.* **Cause and effect language:** *Because of the floods, the soil was fertile.*
- Task management language and language for discussing: *Complete the vocabulary activity. Answer the questions about the text. Discuss your answers with your group.*
- Interactive strategies: Asking and answering questions: *What did the Nile give to the people? Why is water important?*
